Five students, Jess Veacock, Becky Atkins, Gemma Edwards, Reanne Letts and Vicky Black and two members of staff, myself, Mark Horsfield and Nicola Davidson, returned to Plymouth in the early hours of Saturday 14th August having been picked up from Heathrow by Mr Browne the night before.

We had spent nineteen fantastic days in Tanzania and were still buzzing with excitement as we had had such a fruitful and rewarding trip. Our students were amazing ambassadors for the college, taking on every challenge with real enthusiasm, they were real stars. The purpose of the visit was to go to Tabora Girls' Secondary School, the college's link school since 2001, to make the link stronger by getting to know staff and students better, as well as to gather information for the joint project our two schools are involved in. The aim of the project is to learn about each other's culture by comparing differences and similarities between our countries, and looking at the different ways our teenagers deals with life's issues and challenges.

While in Tanzania, our students became totally immersed in the culture, experiencing amongst many other things, speaking Swahili, carrying water on their heads, washing in well water (there were no baths or showers), having their hair braided, wearing African clothes, shopping in markets, eating lots of different types of African food, travelling on very bumpy dusty roads and making building bricks out of mud. Observing life in Tanzania was going on all the time and we made copious records
